Lighting the second candle Tamara Chapman We light the second candle to redeem the pain of loss: the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the loss of health. As we gather up the pain of the past, we offer it to you, O God, asking that into our open hands you will place the gift of peace.

Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

Lighting the third candle Igennifer Palmer We light this third candle to remember ourselves this Christmas time. We pause and remember the past weeks, months, and for some of us, years of difficult times. We remember the poignancy of memories, the grief, the sadness, the hurts, the pain of reflecting on our own mortality.

Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness.

Lighting the fourth candle Christine Duncan This fourth candle is lit to remember our faith and the gift of hope which God offers to us in the Christmas story. We remember that God, who shares our life, also promises us a place and time where pain and suffering will be no more.

Let us remember the One who shows the way and who goes with us into our tomorrows.
